

County Council Promises Action

Parish Councillors are frequently frustrated by the fact that it's not the Parish but the County Council that's responsible for most of the services that residents complain about. At the same time, we have to recognise that, for several years, all Local Authorities have been under exceptional financial constraint, resulting in many services being "cut to the bone".

We can assure readers that Wylam Parish Council does everything within its power to press the appropriate County Councillor or Officer of the Council, in seeking improvement wherever this may be possible.

We can, for example, report a very helpful meeting and inspection of several sites around the village in July with the Neighbourhood Services Manager for this area.

Many issues were raised at this meeting, including the maintenance of some of the paths, behind and between properties on the Dene Estate and on some pavements elsewhere. As a result, spraying of weeds has already been carried out in some locations and better maintenance of the shrubs has been promised during the winter period. Work on the shrubs at this time of year would require men to be taken away from grass cutting, and we know only too well how that would be viewed!

Several other, relatively minor matters, have also already been dealt with as a result of this meeting and further action has been promised.

On the subject of grass cutting, the Parish Council is considering paying the County Council for additional cuts, and at the present time is awaiting details of the financial implications before agreeing to this.

Another major local concern is the condition of roads within the village. Although this comes under Highways rather than Neighbourhood Services,

we have been assured that our specific concerns will be passed to the appropriate local highways officer. As has been done for many years in an effort to highlight problem areas, the Parish Council is about to submit to the County Council the results of a comprehensive visual survey of all roads and pavements within Wylam. One particular concern, expressed by many, is the deteriorating condition of Wylam Wood Road which, as most people will realise, has been used as a "rat run" throughout the extended closure of Ovingham Bridge. This immediately, raises a dilemma. Most of this road is essentially a single-track road with

designated passing places. Excessive repair, particularly to the road margins, tends to make it effectively wider which, in turn, leads to greater use and higher traffic speeds. We are advised that no money has been set aside to repair roads affected by the bridge closure, but the Parish Council will continue to pursue this issue once the bridge reopens, and will try to ensure that its integrity as a single-track road is recognised.

Speaking of reopening of the Ovingham Bridge, the County Council is still saying "September, subject to river levels", but who would put any money on it after all this time?

Summer Fair Success

This year's event began with heavy rain showers around lunchtime but thankfully the afternoon was soon to be blessed with clearer skies and fair weather.

The stalls included many familiar faces but also some new attractions, including livestock from Daniel Farm and a hugely popular bogie time-trial, sponsored by The Black Bull. Egg 'hoying' made a welcome return, although it was soon obvious that contestants would require more practice before starring for Wylam Cricket Club.

Entertainment was provided by the Prudhoe Community Band, Hexham Morris Men, seen performing in the photo here, and Matt the Juggler. A "beat the goalie" competition attracted budding male and female soccer stars while a competition organised by Ryton Rugby Club attempted to encourage use of the oval rather than round ball. The well-

established book sale ran throughout the day at the Methodist Church Centre.

There was no evening event this year and so, as expected, overall profit was down, to about £6,000. None of this would be possible without huge efforts on the part of the Playing Fields Committee, who just about manage to maintain their sanity through the months of planning and on the day of the Fair.

Our thanks go to this committee but also to the many volunteers who help on the day and to the local businesses for their support.

It's very encouraging to see that the new play equipment and games area is being widely used. High-level fencing has had to be installed to prevent damage to adjacent premises but the committee would still be grateful if children would avoid this area for target practice! The committee hope to arrange an "official" opening ceremony for the new play area in the Autumn, when the generosity of the grant awarding bodies will have a chance to be acknowledged.



Church Bells

Andrew Cairns, Bell Tower Captain at St Oswin's writes:-

"We have been pleased to welcome two new members to our band in recent months; one an existing ringer and her fiancé, who are "learning the ropes". Over the summer we have rung for St. Oswin's Day on 20 August and, looking to the autumn, we intend to ring for the following occasions:-

On 18 September, following the morning service, a half-muffled quarter peal will be rung to mark the centenary of the death of Private Appleby, a Wylam bell-ringer who died at The Somme. The 1911 census shows Joseph living at his grandparent's house at 11, Ingham Terrace (aged 19) and his occupation given as Apprentice Compositor in the printing trade. He married Elizabeth Mary Jackson in 1915.

A band of visiting bell-ringers will be coming to St. Oswin's on Wednesday 21 September, to ring from 10.30 to II.30am

On the afternoon of Sunday 6 November we will be ringing to welcome the Bishop of Newcastle who is due to open the refurbished Church

A full peal will be attempted on Saturday 29 November, which should last about three hours. If successful, this will be a significant achievement consisting of 41 different methods (bellringing tunes) which must all be memorised.

Dene Road Congestion Coming Up!

The Parish Council has been advised by Northumbrian Water, as we understand local residents have, that a length of Dene Road, mainly a relatively short length across the junction with Bluebell Close, will be affected for a time while a flood risk reduction project is implemented.

The risk of possible future flooding has been identified and the work is intended to reduce the amount of surface water entering the foul water

This length of road will be dug up to enable a new and larger surface water sewer to be installed.

At the time of writing the work is scheduled to take place some time between I November 2016 and 31 March 2017.

Access will be maintained during the work but traffic lights are bound to cause delays and congestion for a time. As the planned date for this work gets nearer, updates about the work and its timing can be obtained from the Northumbrian Water Community Portal, www.nwlcommunityportal.co.uk

Riverside Path



In the previous issue of the Globe we reported the current status of the landslip that has closed the footpath at the end of Stephenson Terrace, below Wylam Nurseries.

With the help of a grant from the Government Flood Alleviation Scheme, Northumberland County Council was able to commission a geo-technical survey involving the drilling of boreholes around the slip, as can be seen in the accompanying photograph, taken in August.

Core samples have been extracted to a depth of 20m and these have been sent for laboratory testing by consultants.

It is expected that the results will be available to the County Council soon, when the consultants will consider what remedial action, if any, could be taken to rectify the problem. However, as there have been a number of similar problems around the County, the Ovingham to Bywell road being just one example, there is considerable pressure on resources and we have been advised that hopes should not be raised that action to re-instate the footpath will necessarily be possible in the near future.

Wylam First School **Governor Vacancies**

Wylam First School is an integral part of this community and the governing body currently has vacancies for Co-opted Governors and is looking for people to join. Co-opted Governors are appointed by the governing body and do not have to have any current link with the school. In fact, having some members who have no close ties with the school is beneficial in ensuring that the governing body has sufficient internal challenge to carry out their strategic function. This ensures a balance with the Parent and Staff Governors.

The need is for individuals who are prepared to commit some of their time to the running of the school and who can bring their skills and talents to bear in the strategic planning and management that is required.

Governors are appointed to the body for a set period of time (normally four years), but can step down earlier if they need to.

Community Speedwatch



We provided details of this Northumbria Police initiative in our Spring 2015 issue, but are unaware what response there was from Wylam residents, if any, to the invitation to volunteer.

Briefly, after vetting and training, volunteers carry out high visibility speed checks at approved sites within their home area, using the normal police speed detection equipment. They don't stop vehicles but speeders receive warning letters.

PC Lee Davison, who co-ordinates the scheme in this area, is holding a meeting at Wylam Institute on Thursday 15 September at 7.00pm for anyone interested in learning more about the scheme and who might wish to volunteer. This meeting is to be advertised elsewhere by the Police, but if you read this in time it may encourage you to go along.

Development of Stanley Burn House

Although we don't normally comment here on individual planning applications, we did refer in our previous issue to a significant proposal to convert the former Stanley Burn Care Centre on Station Road into 14, one to four bedroom apartments.

This development has now been approved by Northumberland County Council subject to certain amendments, although the number of apartments remains the same, in spite of a number of local objections.

Wylam Parish Council, together with several residents living nearby, expressed concern about the adequacy of the planned parking spaces. This appears to have been addressed by the addition of a further four spaces above those shown on the plans.

Other concerns, chiefly raised by owners of nearby properties and mainly relating to privacy, light pollution and provision for refuse have, according to the Planning Authority, been considered and either dismissed or accepted, with amendments, where considered appropriate, to cover the objection.

Orchard "Apple Day"

Members holding based

of the Wylam Community Orchard are an "Apple Day",

Wylam Library, in the Falcon Centre, on Saturday 24 September between 10.00am and 12 noon.

There will be a "squeezing session" (of the apples we assume) and a chance to taste some of the wide variety of fruit from the orchard.

Everyone is invited to come along and to learn about the orchard project, which now has over eighty fruit trees and over two thousand square metres of wild-flower meadow on the lower half of the field at Wylam First School.

Wylam Hills Development

The planned housing development on the site of the former Wylam Hills Farm is clearly running later than expected.

Several months ago we were advised that demolition of the farm buildings, followed by the process of grouting to fill old mine workings below the site, was expected to be finished in time for building to start in March.

The most recent information given to the Parish Council confirms that the necessary grouting has proved to be far more extensive than expected, although the end of that process is now in sight!



Preparations have been progressing on the east side of the road, as can be seen in this picture. This is where the "affordable" houses are to be built. Work here has included the burying of electricity cables and the installation of drainage, which includes a substantial water retention system, designed to prevent the over-burdening of local sewers when there is heavy rainfall. Concreting the foundations for the first of these houses was recently started, but a late requirement for these to be reinforced with steel has apparently caused a further delay.

Himalayan Balsam

We announced in the Summer issue that the campaign to eradicate as much Himalayan Balsam as possible from the Nature Reserve and riverside areas, would be tackled in June and July.

When that time came it was soon obvious that the heavy silting in the December floods had deposited far more Himalayan Balsam seeds than expected and the team of volunteers had to revert to a 'Plan B'. Pulling out the thousands of individual plants was never going to be practicable and so the attack reverted to scythes and cutting machinery. Several of the larger grass areas were cut and completely cleared. This was very heavy work but it did achieve removal of the plants before they seeded and has opened up the site, creating a more varied habitat.

There's little doubt that the problem will emerge again in future years but we are very grateful to those who helped this year. Without their efforts there was a risk that the Wylam riverside could have become completely overwhelmed by this plant, as unfortunately remains the case in several other locations further upstream.
