

Local Foodbanks Benefit from Wylam's

'Reverse Advent Calendar' How it all started - Wylam resident Kat Conaty writes:

I had seen the idea of a 'reverse advent calendar' on Facebook in 2015. An empty cardboard box on December 1st and every day in the lead up to Christmas a food item is put into the box which is then taken to a local foodbank. I thought how good this process would be to help teach my young children the art of giving, for them to learn to appreciate what they have, especially at a time of year when all of this becomes more meaningful. Telling Rachael Shaw-Kew about the idea over coffee in October 2016, she decided she would do it too. We then thought 'why stop there?!' We live in an amazingly supportive village - why not facilitate a village collection? That was it. Letters went into Wylam First book bags and we set up a page on Facebook - within hours the response had been incredible.

December came and the boxes began to arrive - and they just kept on coming! Rach and I took carloads to Hexham. The Mowden Hall School mini bus, thanks to Anna Little, took a load to Newcastle and a couple of car loads followed too. We were gobsmacked!

We plan to keep the scheme going as long as people are interested in donating. Look out for Facebook posts and posters around Wylam towards the end of the year. We must thank Sarah Leahy, Dave Carr and Fiona at Wylam Institute (plus our husbands and my daughter Izzy) for helping us out in December. What began as a solitary project three years



ago has turned into an epic community project, showing, once again, the fantastic support this village is capable of. Thank you everyone!

Voices of Hope Concert

The Voices of Hope choir (BBC Choir of the Year) returned to St. Oswin's Church on 2nd December and gave another amazing concert, once again raising the roof with their wonderful singing. The concert was followed by afternoon tea in the Institute.

The concert and the tea raised the fantastic sum of £2,600 which was divided between the British Heart Foundation and Brain Tumour Research. My thanks are due to Voices of Hope for coming and to everyone who helped in the organisation and baking for the tea. Thanks also to everyone who attended and made the day such a huge success.

Wylam's Railway Heritage

The Parish Council met National Trust reps recently to get an update on the closure over a year ago of George Stephenson's Birthplace. The Trust is giving no promises yet on reopening, but it has commissioned two pieces of important work.

One is a historical and social study to find out what was happening in Wylam (and, if possible, to George's family) around the time of his birth in 1781. This might lead to a better understanding as to why there were such huge advances in railway technology soon after, both in Wylam and further afield

The second strand of work is looking forward, to explore how the Trust, the Council, local organisations and businesses and village residents can all contribute to making more of Wylam's rich heritage, much of which is a little hidden away and easily missed. We are looking ourselves at how the Council might update and expand past or current sources of information such leaflets, interpretation boards, web sites and of course our own Railway Museum in the Falcon Centre (open library hours).

We might also cooperate with the Trust to have more regular guided walks for both residents and visitors. The Parish Council hopes these could perhaps be combined with occasional openings of the National Trust property in the short term (but not as a substitute for full reopening in the longer term).

By the time you read this we hope that the Trust and the Council will have had a preliminary meeting with local organisations and businesses to look at how we might all contribute to and benefit from more and better promotion of Wylam's heritage. The current intention is that open meetings will follow soon after, culminating in a display and workshop at the Summer Fayre in June. We also hope to work with the Tyne Valley Community Rail Partnership on these issues, tying in with their wider promotion of the Tyne Valley railway line.

Lastly, did you know that 11 March 2018 is the 50th anniversary of the withdrawal of passenger services from North Wylam Station (where the waggonway car park now is) - see www.disused-stations.org.uk/n/north_wylam/index.shtml. We would welcome any memories or photos of the station or line when running - drop them off at the Institute or email to the Councils' email address and we'll do an article in the next Globe.

Closure of Crawcrook Road below Sled Lane

The closure is likely to be for only 6 weeks. There is no fixed start date yet although the order states 28th February. There will be a legal diversion for HGV's via Scotswood Bridge which has to be agreed between Gateshead Council, NCC, Highways England (A69) and the firm that manages the A1. More information will be going on the Gateshead Council website as soon as possible.

There will be pedestrian access throughout the period.

Prior to commencing the work, the trees in the roadside verge will be removed (prior to nesting season). This will be done on a Sunday, with traffic light controls.

Carols around the Christmas Tree on Charlie's Corner



It may now seem a long time ago but on Friday December 22nd we celebrated the tenth anniversary of this opportunity to 'sing your heads off'! Except for one year when the 'Grinch' had to cancel the event due to freezing conditions we have been gathering at 10 o'clock on Charlie's Corner on the last day of the school term for the last ten years. 

Ahead of their evening event, they worked with young people at Wylam First and Ovingham Middle schools to write improvised stories and poems. Lauren and Esther, Year 7 pupils from OMS told us they put together "a song that was all about 'Grandad Tom' and 'an improvised stretcher from World War I'! It was a fantastic experience for all of the pupils and also a great opportunity to improve creativity and have a lot of fun together!". Through the rest of Festival week it was great to see young and old experience the talent of wonderful artists like songwriter Anna Coogan, Mezzo Soprano Madeleine Shaw, story teller Hugh Lupton (below) and Americana trio Ashton Lane.



Some events particularly stand out in the memory like the first Festival outing to Wylam Nursery. As the moon rose on a chilly Monday evening Festival-goers gathered in the richly atmospheric surroundings of the glass house at Tom & Joe's. There, beside the crackling and spitting of a log stove and with breath visible through frosty evening air, a mix of local readers and guest story

teller Pam Pott brought us winter tales in poetry and prose. It was a magical event topped off brilliantly by owner Tom Martin delivering the famous poem 'Stopping By Woods on a Snowy Evening' through the branches of a young potted tree!



On Thursday evening the Festival moved back indoors for an evening called 'Art Amongst The Coal' a special tribute to mark the opening of the new Mining Art Gallery in Bishop Auckland. Backed up by music and prose, experts Bob McManners and Gillian Wales delivered a passionate and gripping account of this increasingly revered generation of artists such as Norman Cornish and Tom McGuinness. It was a fantastic event where people got to meet staff from The Auckland Trust (who run the new gallery) and learned more about how to visit and experience these powerful and evocative works of art.

Wylam Winter Tales is run entirely by volunteers as a voluntary community organisation and will return from Friday 25th January to Friday 1st February 2019 (inclusive).
